the marching of Brazilian protesters and their calls to transform Brazil into the remarkable country tourists once believed it to be during the summer of 2016.

"It must be a peace without victory... Victory would mean peace forced upon the loser, a victor's terms imposed upon the vanquished. It would be accepted in humiliation, under duress, at an intolerable sacrifice and would leave a sting, a resentment, a bitter memory upon which terms of peace would rest, not permanently, but only as upon quicksand. Only a peace between equals can last" (Woodrow Wilson, regarding World War II). Eighty years ago the world was in a state of turmoil. Peace had been eclipsed by hunger for power, and all humaneness was forgotten while a madman ravaged Europe. Even then, a few people still stood for peace. One such person was a young German girl named Sophie Scholl. She was part of a resistance group who called themselves the White Rose. The goal of Sophie Scholl and the White Rose was to protest National Socialism (Nazism) and bring about peace through writing instead of violence.

On May 9, 1921, a mayor and his wife gave birth to a girl named Sophie Scholl in Forchtenberg, Germany. As the fourth out of six children, Sophie led a quiet, normal childhood until Hitler came to power in 1933. At twelve years old, she joined the League of German Girls, the female division of the Hitler Youth, and was soon promoted to Squad Leader. However, the Nazi ideology increasingly conflicted with her values and Christian faith. Her brother and father were both arrested separately for anti-Nazi actions and these events left an impression on her. After graduating from secondary school, Sophie became a kindergarten teacher. In 1941, she began working as a nursery teacher in Blumberg as part of auxiliary war service. Sophie disliked this position and began to involve herself in passive resistance against the war effort. In May 1942, after serving six months in the National Labor Service, she enrolled at the University of Munich, along with her brother Hans. Hans also played a key role in the

resistance, and the two became associated with a group of like-minded resisters.

In early 1942, the White Rose was formed by Hans Scholl, Willia Graf, and Christoph Probst. They wrote and distributed six anti-Nazi leaflets across Munich and mailed them throughout Germany. Some of these writings even made their way to the United States. When Sophie found out about the group, she convinced her brother to let her help. She carried messages and distributed leaflets. As a woman, she was less likely to be randomly stopped by the SS. The pamphlets contained messages such as this: "We will not be silent. We are your bad conscience. The White Rose will not leave you in peace!" (the fourth leaflet). It also contained calls to peaceful action. "Everyone is in a position to contribute to the overthrow of this system... it can be done only by the cooperation of many convinced, energetic people... We have no great number of choices as to these means. The only one available is passive resistance" (the third leaflet). Their goal was to end the genocide of Jews and bring peace to the world. They believed that violence could not end violence and that only peaceful resistance was the solution to ending the war.

Many people say the White Rose underestimated the monstrosity of the war. Not long after they began, on February 18th, 1943, Sophie Scholl, and her brother Hans were arrested while distributing the sixth pamphlet at the University of Munich. Just four days later a trial was held by a passionate Nazi, Roland Freisler, also known as the "hanging judge." In court, Sophie stated, "Somebody, after all, had to make a start. What we wrote and said is also believed by many others. They just don't dare express themselves. I am, now as before, of the opinion that I did the best that I could do for my nation. I therefore do not regret my conduct and will bear the consequences that may result from it." Sophie and Hans, along with Christoph Probst who had been arrested later, were sentenced to death by guillotine and were killed only a few hours later. Sophie's last words were, "How can we expect righteousness to prevail when there

their oppressive socio-political landscape into one of justice and equality. Sadly, these democratic views came with a price. They are the reason she was targeted on the night of March 14, 2018. While driving home, she was assassinated by two men, who appeared to be professional killers having, connections to Jair Bolonsario, Brazil's president. Her death sent a shockwave across the favelas. Her life and devotion to service, despite the tremendous risk she willingly faced, has inspired armies of courageous Brazilians to line the streets and carry on her legacy. More than ever before, they have utilized their power in numbers to demand justice.

When I discovered Marielle's story, I was astonished by her exemplary bravery and persistence. Despite being well aware of the deeprooted corruption embedded into Brazil's government and their infamous hatred of activists, she still chose to stand up for all of the hard-working mothers, unfortunate victims of assault, homeless children, and all other underrepresented groups in Brazil. She stood for those without a voice those who couldn't stand for themselves. She inspires me to work harder to ensure a more peaceful and just world because even in one of the world's most repressed political climates, she still managed to create tangible and fundamental change to the institutions that oppressed her people. As a citizen of the United States, a country where we are entitled to the freedom of speech and our natural rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, I ought to combat the injustices that I and other Americans endure on a daily basis. If there's one lesson Marielle's life has taught me, it is to take advantage of the well-fostered spirit of democracy that has already been instilled into our country.

Marielle Franco paid the ultimate sacrifice in order to defend the most vulnerable citizens of Brazil. She willingly risked her life for what she believed was the greater good. She was a hero. Despite her tremendous impact on the activist culture in Brazil, many only remember her for conspiracies clouding her death, rather than her efforts to consolidate peace. Nevertheless, her life's impact can still be vibrantly heard through

legislature's Commission for Human Rights Defense. After years of garnering political experience, in 2016, Marielle decided to run for a position as a city councillor of Rio de Janeiro. In a world where only 11% of elected councillor positions in Brazil are held by women (Corral), the odds were stacked against her; especially considering that she was also a woman of color and part of the LGBT community, with both groups being heavily discriminated against in Brazil. Nonetheless, she won the election by a landslide and received the fifth highest vote total out of more than 1,500 candidates (Giangrande). As one of the only politicians with her unique background and demographic, she accumulated massive support and attention. For Brazil's corrupt, oppressive government, she represented an anomaly.

Throughout her career, Marielle worked to provide justice to the underrepresented populations of the favelas and created peace in a community driven by gangs and violence. As a city councillor, Marielle stressed issues relating to corruption and the favelas in many of her bills. On December 9, 2018, she passed a bill into law, which campaigned against the harassment of women, especially at schools. The bill utilized widespread advertisement through the public transit system, which explained and denounced sexual harassment, and vouched for the use of public transit video surveillance cameras as a method of identifying violators (Assédio). She later authored Espaço Coruja, or Owl Space, a bill which currently provides night-time nurseries for the children of working families to accommodate for night shifts (Espaço). Furthermore, she accommodated Brazil's youth by passing a bill which promotes the social reintegration of juvenile offenders through various governmentalservices and socioeconomic measures. These programs were imperative in developing responsibility and initiative in these young adults, while also encouraging the, "reinsertion of adolescents in the educational system," (Establishment). However, despite the many life-changing bills which she authored and passed, arguably the most notable impact she had throughout her life was empowering the common people of Brazil to realize that they had the power and strength to rise up and transform

is hardly anyone willing to give himself up individually to a righteous cause? Such a fine sunny day, and I have to go, but what does my death matter, if, through us, thousands of people are awakened and stirred to action?" The Nazis continued their investigation and other members of the White Rose were later arrested.

Upon learning of Sophie's life and death, many people inside and outside the country were inspired to join the fight for freedom and justice in Nazi Germany. Franz J. Müller, the last surviving participant of the White Rose, said, "[Children] tend to be amazed by what we did, but Hans and Sophie Scholl really did not want to be heroes. Friendship and freedom were the values most important to them." Sophie was not trying to gain money or fame; she just wanted to abolish the evil in Germany. She was only twenty-one, yet her actions are still remembered. Today she inspires us to stand up for peace and justice by using writing and other non-violent methods. We must remember that often, "the pen is mightier than the sword." If we say we are against violence and then try to end violence using violence, our actions will prove our words untrue. Sophie inspires me by demonstrating that something as simple as writing could have an enormous impact on the world.

"Stand up for what you believe in even if you are standing alone" (Sophie Scholl). Sophie and the members of the White Rose lived out this quote. They stood up against the Nazis, even when others were afraid; and they did so in a peaceful manner. With strength and determination, Sophie Scholl fought for peace and justice, through writing.

There are a large amount of Asian-American women who've dedicated their lives to activism, fighting for peace and justice. Their names remain unknown to most Amercians, even though they've played such a large role in the way lives are today. Yuri Kochiyama is a great example of one of these women. She is a Japanese American who's faced the racial inequity of the government, and fought hard for not only for

Brazil's Voice in a Country Choked by Oppression

As hordes of tourists and excited fans flooded the terminals of Rio de Janeiro's international airport during the summer of 2016, they poured out of the exits to behold the breathtaking city. Modern infrastructure, picturesque views, and extensive security impressed travelers as they prepared to head toward the stadium where the Olympics were being held. As they drove through the highway, where a road barrier displaying vibrant, colorful art lined the road, they may have noticed the glossy new skyscrapers adorning the coastline. Rio de Janeiro appeared to perfectly coalesce with the standards of the idyllic city. But all of those delightful expectations were nothing more than a lie. Only a few yards away from that very highway, intentionally hidden by the recently developed road barriers, were the favelas, or Brazilian slums. Drug lords and gang members were, and still are, the only authorities present in these parts of the city. The area is practically patrolled by gang members freely strolling around with machine guns slung across their backs. In the Maré favela, one of the deadliest parts of the city, Marielle Franco, a young mother attending university, advanced through the chaos.

As an LGBT woman of color living in the favelas, Marielle Franco was born and raised in a world of discrimination and desperation. She began working at the ripe age of eleven (Maliutchenko) to pay for her college education and bore her first child at the age of 18 (Viola). Unfortunately, tragedy rattled her life in 2000 when she experienced the loss of a close friend to gun violence (Maliutchenko). As she struggled to cope with the pain of her loss, Marielle transformed her anguish into action, as she immersed herself into the world of human rights activism. She promptly pursued a degree in social sciences and joined the state

Specifically, I have gained knowledge from Cole as I have always enjoyed picking apart his lyrics, educating myself on ideas that I may have never known of. Overall, Cole has allowed me to access a creative side of myself as he has inspired me to search for new methods to speak up.

Cole, a known and accomplished rap artist has continued to carry his own legacy, guiding massive groups of people including myself to spread peace and understanding. Although his form of expression is often overlooked and mocked, he finds a way to attract the eyes of others through the originality he brings to the table. Therefore, Cole has proven himself to be a hero of peace as he has created an accepting and loving environment for all people.

Asian-Americans, but a variety of different ethnic backgrounds to grow together towards a peaceful future. Yuri Kochiyama is a lesser known activist who has worked for both peace and justice through non-violent and non military means, inspiring me to make the world a more peaceful place as well.

Yuri Kochiyama dedicated her life to decreasing racial injustice; helping African-Americans while freeing political prisoners was just a part of it. According to "Asian American Activism: The Continuing Struggle", Kochiyama took part in the Civil Rights movement while "learning about Black history and listening to Black speakers, writers, and activists... Kochiyama shifted toward Black liberation, joining the Republic of New Africa, a militant Black nationalist organization in Harlem." ("Yuri Kochiyama" 2) With this, Kochiyama promoted and pushed for integrated education, giving young black children a chance at education as well. The way she would put time and effort into researching topics that would have little benefit for her showed how selfless she was, as well as how much she cared for the well being of those around her. In "Yuri Kochiyama (1921-2014)", Kazuyo Tsuchiya explains that "Yuri's keen interest in equality and justice led her to work for the sake of political prisoners in the U.S. and other parts of the world in her later years. Yuri was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2005 for her tireless struggles against imperialism and racism." (Tsuchiya 3). As a victim to the Japanese internment camps as well as her father's passing as a political prisoner, she knew first hand the feeling others felt; she knew the oppression and inequality had to be fixed. Of course, the racial injustice of society wouldn't fix itself, so she decided to do something about it. For the rest of her life, Kochiyama worked through ups and downs to advocate a future of the togetherness of all people.

Kochiyama's actions were just as impactful as they were important. She inspired many to advocate for a future where society worked together, as well as pushed for reparations to give back nearly-lost lives of innocents. In a tribute to Yuri, Scott Kurashige reminisces "I am one of thousands whose lives were

immensely touched by Yuri Kochiyama. Not all of those people are Asian American, but for those who are, Yuri directly and indirectly helped us connect our own identity struggles to the broader and more radical struggle for human liberation." (Kurashige 1). Being one of the many individuals who were deeply inspired by Kochiyama, Kurashige found great interest researching America's racial injustice as well as spreading her ideas through his love of writing. She had given many people of color a sense of justice in the American world, and changed many lives both positively and heavily. Her actions were also very important as she saved the lives of many political prisoners. "She 'Has Become an Ancestor?—Yuri Kochiyama's Legacy: I remember" recalls how "It is no accident that political prisoner, Abu-Jamal, would commemorate Yuri Kochiyama. Abu-Jamal, who was framed by Philadelphia police and convicted through prosecutorial misconduct for the 1982 murder of policeman Daniel Faulkner, always maintained his innocence." (Taylor 4). Koriyama not only changed lives, but saved them as well. Abu-Jamal was only one of the many accused innocents Kochiyama had fought for; she worked as best as she could with many of her friends to free as much as she could have. Her hard work heavily inspires me as a young American who also wants the togetherness of all people.

The dedication of Yuri Kochiyama makes me want to help others as much as I can as well, whether the impact be large or small. One of my favorite quotes from her is "Our ultimate objective in learning about anything is to try to create and develop a more just society" (Kochiyama). My ideal future would be to improve the relationships of society, to shape a world that is more peaceful and fair. World peace may be labeled impossible, but activists like Kochiyama inspire me to help the world take another step towards the concept. Another favorite quote of mine is, "...transform yourself first...Because you are young and have dreams and want to do something meaningful, that in itself, makes you our future and our hope. Keep expanding your horizon, decolonize your mind, and cross borders." (Kochiyama)

abusive stepfather. Although many share similar experiences and can relate to him, not many are able to create positivity from negative memories. Following, Cole's illustrative and poetic music features a sense of depth that presents questions to society and future generations. By creating music that has deep meaning, Cole fights his own peaceful protest. As more and more people see the beauty in his work, they gain knowledge which is indeed the most powerful gift. Whether or not everyone agrees with his perspective, it can be recognized that Cole has taken an approach to activism that not many have achieved.

On a global level, Cole has impact a wide range of people of all races, religions, and genders by using his music to persuade others to fight for their own beliefs whether they agree with him or not. One specific way he has contributed to a more just world is that he has identified racial inequalities he has seen throughout his life, whether it be directed at others or himself. For instance, Cole's song, 1985, identifies modern representation of white privilege in relation to cultural appropriation. He harshly explains the want for other people to be black culture wise until it comes to living reality as an African American. Moving on, Cole's live performances are arguably the most impactful part of his character as an artist as he is able to create personas and attitudes that reflect a deeper meaning. In one performance with the singer Daniel Caesar, Cole preaches the false reality of the temporary high that results from drugs as he takes on the role of a person under the influence. Stepping out of this role, he transforms his characteristics and mannerisms into himself and proceeds to lecture the audience on the benefits of an alternate method. meditation. By performing a song like this, Cole influences others to become sober themselves and attempt to meditate as a more beneficial solution to any struggles they may endure. Overall, Cole has consistently upheld a platform that encourages and informs others.

She became the founder of the Women in Peacebuilding Network and helped run protests with multiple races of people to get rid of President Taylor. It brought many people to the cause and eventually, Taylor resigned and went into exile. In his wake, a peace treaty was signed which mandated a transitional government.

Leymah became a global leader and was requested at the United Nations Commission to share her opinion on matters such as women's rights. She has inspired people around the world for her strength and perseverance, as well as her ability to peacefully solve horrible situations. Leymah once said, "You can never leave footprints that last if you are always walking on tiptoe." When Leymah started to unite people she didn't intend to leave a whisper; she would leave an entire story that would be passed on to inspire others.

Leymah shows that we don't need to use violence to solve problems. In America, there are riots that sometimes end up in bloodshed and grief. The Women in Peacebuilding Network

The mission of the Boy Scouts of America is "to serve others by helping to instill values in young people and, in other ways, to prepare them to make ethical choices during their lifetime in achieving their full potential. The values we strive to instill are based on those found in the Scout Oath and Law" (Mission and Purpose of the Boy Scouts of America). In 1917, after the war had ended, Baden-Powell wanted Boy Scouts to strive for and maintain peace (Celebrating the life and legacy of Baden-Powell). This man inspired generations of young people, wrote many books, earned honorary degrees, decorations, and nineteen foreign scout awards (Baden-Powell Introduction). Anyone that has been in Scouting has benefited from his visionary ideas. I feel that through his lifetime work of promoting the well-being of young people, he was instilling qualities that would stay with a person as they become adults. Baden-Powell was an individual who worked for peace and justice by educating young people. Seventy years after his death, Messengers of Peace, a global initiative was launched in over 220 countries to inspire young men and women to work harder on Baden-Powell's dream of peace through scouting (Alder, 2015)

Baden-Powell's actions were an important contribution to building a more peaceful and just world. He was an insightful man who realized that teaching and instilling values when a boy was young, would help to ensure that he would not only be self-fulfilled but would play a positive role in society when he grew older. Baden-Powell is considered the father of Boy Scouts, an organization that has had millions of boys go through the program. Over a hundred years later, I have followed the principles that were first presented by Baden Powell. The first time I heard of Robert Baden-Powell was

made sure that everyone would stay safe and calm during their protests. At one point the military arrived and attempted to arrest Leymah. She used smarts instead of strength and threatened to disrobe them which, according to traditional beliefs, was a curse that would bring a horrible misfortune upon them. They immediately stood down and Leymah created a turning point that would lead to the resignation of President Taylor.

I am inspired by Leymah Gbowee because she makes me feel as if I have the power to do something in this world. Violence is not needed to leave a mark on society. Leymah and her network inspire all people around the world, not only women, to stand up for themselves in a peaceful and just manner. Leymah believes, "As we build peace, let's not forget the youth as they are our future." She understood that the foundation beneath the peace they built, needs to outlive them. "Bring me the hair clippers!" That's what I would say if I was Anna Ennis-Hatton, the co-founder of the First Tuesday Project in Modesto. Prior to this organized monthly program you would find Anna with her hair cutting supplies at various spots around Modesto. She would also be found once in a while at Beard's Park where all homeless were stationed by the city, but it became very unsafe, so she had to stop and find a new location. This brought to mind how Anna could spread her talent to every unfortunate citizen in her hometown. Anna gives haircuts to people that can't afford to have it done elsewhere. Providing haircuts gave a sense of peace and social justice for a fresh start to those who need it most.

Feeling unsafe sharing her talents, led to the birth of the First Tuesday Project with Interfaith Ministries, whose mission is "Many faiths; one purpose-restoring dignity, health and hope" (Interfaith). The routine for each client starts with taking a shower at the Cleansing Hope Shower Shuttle, then they receive a haircut by a licensed volunteer hairstylist, including Anna, and then they are encouraged to visit the Clothes Closet for twenty pieces of clothing. Anna shared with me the types of clients that they serve. Some are homeless, others have just come out of jail, several have lost their jobs, a few are behind in their bills, and others come from nearby shelters. Each month Anna has around 20-60 clients.

Her actions help contribute to building a more peaceful world because she helps homeless people of the community to feel cared for. Anything can be frightening, especially inviting someone that is different through your eyes. "I have worked with some of the richest people on earth and also with the ones that have nothing... and you know what? There is not much difference between the two. We are all people no

Division I - 2<sup>nd</sup> Place Noah Scarbrough Hughson HS Robert Baden-Powell: A Peace Activist

Well-known recipients of the Nobel Peace Prize include people such as Elie Wiesel, Nelson Mandela, Jimmy Carter, and Barack Obama. This prestigious award can be given to an individual that promotes peace between nations (All Nobel Peace Prizes). However, there are many individuals that also promote peace that are not as widely known. An individual who had been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 1928, but probably is not as widely known, is a man named Robert Baden-Powell (Nomination Database - Peace). This man had a vision of a peaceful world of brotherhood. What Baden-Powell is most widely known for is his contribution to the world of scouting. He is named the "Chief Scout of the World" (Baden-Powell Introduction). He was a person that wanted to help others and help them prepare for their lives ahead of them. Despite not being known by many people today, Robert Baden-Powell was a promoter of peace during his lifetime.

I believe Baden-Powell made important contributions to promote a peaceful and just world. After returning back home from his military duties in 1903, Baden-Powell discovered he was a national hero. A book he had originally written for soldiers, Aids to Scouting, was being used by youth leaders to teach youth various survival skills. His fame led to invitations to speak across Britain and was asked to come up with ways to improve citizenship training for boys. He rewrote his book, removing military references, for younger boys and in 1907 organized a camp that included boys from wealthy families and those from working-class families. Regardless of social standing, all boys could stand to learn and develop their citizenship. This was the start to the scout movement. His book, which started as a training guide became the handbook for the Movement.

Services (CDSS) showed that during the years of 2013 to 2017, Stanislaus County alone received 1,087 refugees.

Just as Thompson said, "Peace is not created through passivity and quietism and in order to aid in the building of a peaceful and just world", Yasir did the exact opposite. He assists in this vision by getting involved and rallies for these families to be helped by sharing the situation of these hardships struck families and how anyone everyone can help.

Yasir's fierce sense of dedication and strength has inspired in many ways, I could fill a book. I had the opportunity to work beside him for many aspects of Al-Misbah's Resettlement projects in the initial stages of the non-profit and every step taught me a lesson. Upon seeing a need for something that would bring peace, even to one person, you should seize the opportunity and make it happen. Al-Misbah wasn't built overnight, it was through hard work, dedication, faith, strength, and perseverance.

After experiencing the surge of refugees in real-time, Yasir gathered up the strength and will power to be a change in this momentous event. With an imagination that was the sky's limit, Yasir used his strong sense of justice to turn his sympathy for these displaced families into energy that would fuel his vision and succession of Al-Misbah. All of his continuous efforts have made me realize that I and anyone can work together to create a more peaceful and just world by simply taking action.

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matter what. We are the same makeup, just some of our circumstances are different from one another. God created us equal even though at times we forget that." (Ennis-Hatton)

Anna inspires me through great ways as she begins to change the world and make every human feel equally cared for, even when someone is suffering deeply in their lives. Through Anna's twenty years of hairstyling her life has changed profoundly. She has helped me to understand how to feel more comfortable around homeless people when I am at the park or at one of my baseball games. She explained to me how to use my inside courage to look them in the eyes and smile. "You never know what a simple 'hello' can do for another person." (Ennis-Hatton) I feel empowered to seek out and care for the unfortunate people around me.

Everyone should have the opportunity to feel cared for and loved. Anna chose to start this city-wide project, where she helps the unfortunate become ready for a fresh start. She inspired me to follow in her great adventures. Her genuine respect for people brings peace to Modesto.

Chris Whitler is a man who demonstrates peace, love, and kindness greatly. He does all of the little things without anyone knowing. He works without complaining. He goes the extra mile to make others happy. He is my definition of a hero who works for peace. My father is someone who is

trusted by many people from all walks of life. He works at a residential care facility for the mentally ill where he organizes games for them, sings songs with them, and takes them out on trips. My father believes that kindness is the way to peace. He shows kindness to me, kindness to others, kindness to people in need, even kindness to people who may not seem to deserve kindness. No matter who they are, what they look like, where they have been, what choices they have made, he still loves them and cares for them. That is my definition of a hero who works for peace.

Hippopotamus kill five hundred people a year and crocodiles are reported to kill over one thousand people a year. (What Are the...) Harmon Parker builds bridges in Kenya, Africa, so people do not have to be killed by lethal animals or floods. Parker is a little-known hero working for peace and justice by saving lives with bridges.

Parker's first trip to Kenya was a weeklong mission trip where he built a house. This is where he fell in love with the people, especially the children. He learned about the dangerous conditions of Kenya and decided to make saving lives and helping families his lifelong passion. Parker has been building bridges in Kenya for thirty years. He says, "They (the people of Kenya) have brought me a clear sense of purpose and meaning." (Living in a Walking World)

Unquestionably, the rivers in Kenya are treacherous. They have taken lives from every village across the flood plain. Not only are the rivers vicious, they are also barriers. They prevent people from reaching doctors, children from attending school, and merchants from reaching the markets. After a community bridge was built in one village, the local school attendance rose from 250 students to 600. Another time there was a mother who was taking her sick baby to the hospital. The hospital was ten miles away but when she had walked seven miles, the river was too full to cross and she had to turn back.

This year I have decided to help to build a house just like Parker. Every year I go to summer camp and see all the friends I only see once a year. However, this year I am going to forgo camp so I can attend Project Mexico. While in Mexico, I will help build a house for a family who doesn't have one. Every year children die because they do not have a warm place to live. I hope this experience will build in me a life-long desire to help others and remain focused on the needs around me. I want to be a bridge-builder and change the world.

Parker has dedicated his life to building bridges and bringing peace and justice to Kenya. Those bridges have improved people's lives by enabling students to attend school and families to reach life saving health care. His life has inspired me to sacrifice part of my summer to help and

serve others. By building bridges, our unsung hero, Harmon Parker, is saving lives and working for a more peaceful and just world.

Did you know that baking helped the bus boycott? Georgia Gilmore was born on February 5, 1920. She was a fearless cook who helped fund the bus boycott. In that time she made fried chicken, pies, pork chops, and pound cake. All of the money she made was given to the bus boycott. Gilmore raised so much money that she inspired other women to help raise money secretly for the bus boycott. Georgia started a secret club called "The Club From Nowhere." They used this name because no one knew were the money was coming from. (Godoy)

- Explain why this person's actions are an important contribution to building a more peaceful and just world.
- Tell how the work of this person might inspire you to also find ways to work for a more peaceful and just world.

Print your word count at the end of the text of your essay, Then show Works Cited for any quotations, borrowed ideas and facts that are not general knowledge. (The title and citations are not included in the word count.) If you are uncertain about plagiarism, ask your teacher. # Screening and Judging of Essays

Selection of essay finalists and winners is a completely blind process. After all of the essays are submitted in November, each essay is assigned a unique number, which is written on both the essay and the submittal form. The submittal forms are removed and given to our data base administrator. He logs them into the data base. No one else has access to the data base or submittal forms thereafter. There are no identifying marks on the essays except the assigned number. The essays go through several rounds of screening, with 20 of the best essays picked and passed to the next level and combined with other best essays at that level. Finally at the highest screening level, 20 essays are picked in each division as Finalists. Finalists essays go to three or four judges in each division. The judges have 2 weeks to review and rank their essays. The 13 judges met on the evenings of February 3 and 4 (two divisions each evening) to discuss their recommendations and come up with a consensus of the winners, honorable mentions and school winners. Only after the judges have met and submitted their selections (by the code number) to the data base administrator, are the winners known.

Peace is understood to mean not only an absence of hostilities or war, but also a state of harmony and justice existing between people, groups or nations. All over the globe and throughout history, there have been people who have steadily worked for peace and justice through non-violent and non-military means. They have worked alone and sometimes joined with others, often working behind the scenes. These people are the rarely recognized heroes of peace.

Martin Luther King, Jr., Gandhi or Mother Teresa are examples of well known peacemakers. However, there are many people whose peacemaking efforts are not widely recognized. The experiences of these unheralded peacemakers are sometimes told in songs and stories, but seldom make the history books.
